Department News:

Craig Clunas gave the keynote address at the conference 'Chinese Opera in Visual and Material Culture' at the University of Chicago in April. His lecture on 'Metapainting and the Chinese Example' can now be watched online at <http://www2.warwick.ac.uk/fac/arts/emforum/events/metapietorial/>.

He's mostly been deep in preparation for the exhibition, 'Ming: 50 years that changed China', http://www.britishmuseum.org/whats_on/exhibitions/ming.aspx which opens at the British Museum on 18 September; writing part of the catalogue, working on labels and multimedia guides, and even coming up at short notice with suggestions for Ming-themed cocktails (anyone for a Mingtini?). An interview about the exhibition was published in UK Business Post, the UK Chinese-language newspaper, and he spoke about the show to the Edgar Wind Society and to Chinese scholars and students in Oxford. Craig is on research leave until TT15.

Hanneke Grootenboer's book on *Treasuring the Gaze* won the Kenshur Prize for best interdisciplinary book in 18th century studies from Indiana University in Bloomington, US; she travels to Bloomington this month to receive the award.

Hanneke accompanied a group of BA students on a trip to Italy over the Easter break, visiting Florence, Siena and Volterra.



Hanneke also co-convened the inaugural symposium of The Institute for Visual Research, 'Art Out of Time: Challenging Periodization' at which art historians, artists and curators from museums, art schools and universities in Oxford and beyond jointly gave their view on bringing objects from different time periods and different geographical areas together. Speakers included Amy Powell from UC Irvine, Whitney Davis, from Berkeley and the University of York, Elizabeth Price

(Turner Prize winner 2012), and Alexander Sturgis, the incoming Director of the Ashmolean Museum. In a series of four workshops lead by (former) HoA graduates, more in-depth discussions alternated with general Q&A sessions. The reception was held in the newly installed show by Barbara Kruger in Modern Art Oxford. Hanneke is on secondment as Head of the Ruskin School of Art, 2014-16.



Geraldine Johnson visited Paris at the beginning of the summer for the opening of the exhibition on the French sculptor Jean-Baptiste Carpeaux at the Musée d'Orsay. While there, she also visited several exhibitions and collections related to her research on sculpture and photography, as well as looking at Renaissance works in Parisian museums. She will be Head of Department in the coming academic year.

Gervase Rosser and Jane Garnett are the joint winners of the Art and Christianity Enterprise (ACE) International Book Prize 'for a book which makes an outstanding contribution to the dialogue between religious faith and the arts'. Their book about miraculous images, *Spectacular Miracles. Alastair Wright will be a Leverhulme Research Fellow for the 2014-2015 academic year. During his research leave he will work on a book examining representations of death and belatedness in Neo-Impressionism. He has recently completed an essay on Gauguin's interest in the frailties of vision for an exhibition to take place at the Beyeler Foundation in 2015 and is preparing an article on the politics of embodied spectatorship in the work of Ford Madox Brown. He continues to serve on the editorial board of the Oxford Art Journal.

Matthew Walker has recently been appointed to a Lectureship in the Department and he is delighted that he will be staying on in Oxford for two more years. In May, he and Clare Hills-Nova (the Art and Architecture Librarian of the Bodleian) organised an Edgar Wind Society event at the Taylor Institute in Oxford. Matthew gave a short presentation on Robert Taylor and the audience then enjoyed a temporary exhibition of Taylor's drawings and architectural books. The evening was a great success; with Taylor's immaculately preserved collection of Piranesi etchings deemed to be the highlight. In June, Matthew also gave a paper on the collections of the English architect William Talman. In the talk, which took place in the Ashmolean, he presented research that he has undertaken in the Print Room of the Museum. He is now busy finishing his first book, provisionally titled *Architecture and Knowledge in Early Modern England*.

Camille Mathieu also joins the Department this coming academic year as a Departmental Lecturer for one year while Alastair is on research leave. Camille will teach the BA option on *The Experience of Modernity* and the MSt optional course on *French Painting, 1880-1912*.

This summer in the Visual Resources Centre two of this year's MSt students, **Dina Akhmadeeva** and **Dan Udy** have been working on the initial phase of digitising selected materials from both the 35mm and lantern slide (3¼" plate slide) collections.

These will be made available for teaching and research and some of the historic materials will also feed into the HEIR Project <http://www.arch.ox.ac.uk/HEIR.html> in which we are project partners and contributors.

Vicky is also co-organising with the HEIR Project directors, Dr Sally Crawford and Dr Katharina Ulmschneider, a workshop taking place at TORCH (The Oxford Research Centre in the Humanities) on 15 November around the theme 'The History of Photography and the Photography of History', as part of the *Being Human Festival* <http://beinghumanfestival.org/>. 

A publication of the proceedings is in the works.

Harriet Costelloe (MSt 2013) is now back in Oxford as a Digital Archivist at the Bodleian Library. She is processing a range of archival material on both traditional and digital formats, and the Bodleian is sponsoring her to become a qualified archivist.

Rachel Dedman (BA 2011) completed a Fellowship at Harvard last year and has since been living and working in Beirut, Lebanon. Here she has been a participant in Ashkal Alwan's Home Workspace Program, for which she is co-editing a publication, *History as Commodity*, in association with e-flux. Rachel is also writing and curating projects for the Palestinian Museum (Ramallah), Visualizing Palestine (Beirut), The Mosaic Rooms (London) and for 98weeks (Beirut) as curator-in-residence. She was recently announced as the first-place winner of the apexart (New York) Franchise Program 2014-15, with the exhibition 'Space Between Our Fingers', opening in Beirut next May. Rachel was awarded a full scholarship by Independent Curators International to attend their Curatorial Intensive in Moscow in August,

where discussion explored contemporary curatorial practice in regions with emerging art infrastructures, cultures and institutions. She would love to connect with other alumni working on or in the Middle-East!
